DIRECTOR'S REPORT

As I write this report, two hefty catalogues (**Beyond Words and Lecture Notes**) are being readied for the press, and a third book documenting Denyse Thomasos's immersive painting **Tracking** looms large on the publication schedule. **Reunion**, an experimental volume pairing poems commissioned from the Nova Scotian writer Kathy Mac with drawings by West Coast visual artist Elizabeth MacKenzie, will be delivered soon. The **Changing Times** (2002) and **Spacing Places** (2003) film and video catalogues are currently best-sellers at ABC Art Books Canada, the gallery's distributor. MSVU Art Gallery remains the sole visual art organization in Nova Scotia that regularly produces curated and documented screenings of experimental film.

The activity in our publishing program is matched by a new focus on documenting and exhibiting the University's permanent collection. In 2004 we initiated the **Small Groups** series of permanent collection exhibitions with **Work Work** and **Too small too big**. These small shows, which allow the curator to foster "friendships" among previously unacquainted works, make ideal projects for our annual Curatorial Assistant. Another benefit is the generation of research and published writing to which the Canadian curatorial community will have access.

By far the largest project connected with the collection in 2003-2004 was the virtual exhibition Alice Egan Hagen (1872-1972) Nova Scotia Woman Ceramicist. Commissioned by the Canadian Heritage Information Network for the Community Memories section of the Virtual Museum of Canada web site, the project entailed months of work by historian Janet Guildford, archivist/data expert Christine Lovelace, and Alice Hagen's descendants in the Campbell family. Curatorial staff of the Nova Scotia Museum and Mahone Bay Settlers Museum also provided indispensable help. The result is a richly informative web site (and CD-ROM available from the gallery) filled with previously unpublished ephemera, family anecdotes and contextual insights. Owing partly to the improved accessibility of information about our Alice Hagen holdings, there are plans to include selected works in a major exhibition at the Gardiner Museum of Ceramic Art, Toronto, and a small display at the home of the Lieutenant Governor, Halifax.

In March 2003 the gallery commenced a commissioning program centred on a large light box purchased by the gallery and mounted outside the exhibition space. We have completed the first commission, the transparency **Homemade** by Tonia Di Risio, and plan to add commissioned transparencies annually. The priorities of this program are to build audience for contemporary art, to provide production opportunities for Nova Scotian artists, to intervene in campus spaces normally dominated by advertising, and to expand our capacity to exhibit new acquisitions.

Highlights of exhibitions organized by the gallery in the past year include two ambitious group exhibitions: **Beyond Words**, which will travel to the Art Gallery of Bishop's University and is featured on the curated web site www.samplesize.ca; and **Lecture Notes**, which placed local production in the context of Joseph Beuys's charismatic lecture-performances and was reviewed in Canadian art. **General Idea Editions**, a touring retrospective in which MSVU Art Gallery collaborated, drew a great deal of attention and spawned a satellite "shoe pageant" in the library vitrines entitled **Mean Feet**. These and other exhibitions were visited by university classes from the studio disciplines, Modern Languages, Public Relations, Cultural Studies, Women's Studies and English.

LIKE A CANDLE

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery

for the MSVU Library vitrines

Like a Candle 1998 was an edition of wax figures (with wicks) of Princess Diana, fabricated by Halifax artist Catherine Jones. The figures, some of which were burned on the anniversary of Diana's death, appeared alongside the iconic Warhol screenprint *Marilyn Monroe* 1967. Like much of Andy Warhol's production, this exhibition wove together themes of glamour, celebrity and death as relayed in media culture.

15 March to 4 May

BLIND STAIRS

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery & Southern Alberta Art Gallery

Blind Stairs included works in a variety of media dating from the early 1980s to present by artists Janice Gurney, Mary Scott and Arlene Stamp. Since each artist incorporated traces of other persons (who may or may not be artists) in her production, this group mid-career retrospective avoided the tendency of solo retrospectives to separate artistic authorship from historical context. Instead it offered a chance to explore patterns of affiliation and appropriation that indicated a particular artistic subjectivity.

17, 24 & 31 July

SPACING PLACES, PLACING SPACES

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery and La Femme 100 têtes curatorial collective Screenings: Bell Auditorium, Nova Scotia College of Art and Design

Spacing Places was the sequel to **Changing Times**, the video and experimental film series presented by MSVU Art Gallery in 2002. Recent works by Kika Thorne, Paulette Phillips, Michael Snow, Manon Labreque, Nelson Henricks and other Canadian artists were selected for their relevance to the politics and poetics of location. Each evening explored a broad category of spatial experience ("home", "travel" and "close-up"), concluded on 31 July with a retrospective of videos by visiting Montreal artist Nikki Forrest. Screenings were presented in cooperation with the Nova Scotia College of Art & Design and the Atlantic Filmmakers Cooperative. La Femme 100 têtes acknowledges financial support from the Canada Council Media Arts section.

30 August through 12 October

GENERAL IDEA EDITIONS 1967-1995

Barbara Fischer, Curator

Organized by the Blackwood Gallery, U of T at Mississauga

"This is the story of General Idea and the story of what we wanted. We wanted to be famous, glamorous and rich. . . We knew that if we were famous and glamorous we could say we were artists and we would be. We did and we are. We are famous, glamorous artists." Operating under assumed names as the corporate entity General Idea, AA Bronson, Felix Partz and Jorge Zontal perfected the inhabitation of commercial formats such as the beauty pageant (*Miss General Idea*), the fanzine (*FILE*) and the museum shop (*Yen Boutique*). This retrospective of G.I.'s internationally esteemed production included posters, balloons, wallpapers, cocktail accessories and other countercultural souvenirs that retrace the spread of the Image Virus. MSVU Art Gallery was the sole Atlantic venue on the North American tour of this long-awaited exhibition.

10 September through 26 October

MEAN FEET

MSVU Library Vitrines

In the spirit of Miss General Idea, the gallery invited women, men and others to contribute one sexy specimen of feminine footwear to an exhibition in the library showcases. Entries from on and off campus were welcome. This was a shoe pageant. Viewers voted for their favourite shoes. A cash prize of \$50. was awarded.

ILLUMINATIONS

MSVU Art Gallery Light Box Commissions

MSVU Art Gallery inaugurated a new acquisition project funded in part by Nova Scotia Tourism and Culture. The gallery will from time to time commission backlit transparencies for exhibition in a light box (such as those displaying advertisements in malls and airports) mounted in the foyer outside the gallery. Tonia Di Risio, of Halifax, was invited to contribute a Duratrans image derived from her existing series, *Homemade*. To prepare her tableau-style photographs, Di Risio set up a doll's house peopled by photographic cutouts of herself and her Italian-Canadian relatives. *Homemade* resonates decisively with the surrounding institutional architecture, whose every detail declares public space to be separate from private space.

22 October through 23 November

BEYOND WORDS

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery

National in scope, *Beyond Words* encompassed works by Gilbert Boyer, Paul de Guzman, Nelson Henrick, Kelly Mark, Elizabeth MacKenzie and Ruth Cuthand, Nadia Myre, Sylvia Ptak and Robert Racine Letraset collage, dyed gauze, beadwork and video were some of the media represented. Each work displayed print, script or letterforms that have been rendered difficult or impossible to read. What happens when words turn opaque or indecipherable? The artists of **Beyond Words** treat this condition as a starting point, the "thunderclap of stupefaction" that precedes insight. Of special note was Algonkin-Québécois artist Nadia Myre's over-beading of the **The Indian Act**. Her 56 red-and-white "pages" entitled *Indian Act* express estrangement and incomprehension, eloquently talking back to the legislation.

30 October through 14 December 2003

HAIR IN HAND

with works by whitefeather and Andrea Ward

Women's hair is both a thriving industry and an endless source of personal angst and fantasy. The works in this exhibition provided further insights into women's attitudes about their hair. Andrea Ward incorporates actual hair into intimate portraits of the 42 individuals she interviewed for the project "Hair Stories." Whitefeather, a textile artist from Fredericton, weaves and embroiders hair to make objects of ritual significance.

27 November through 14 December

29th ANNUAL MOUNT COMMUNITY SHOW

From quilts to baking and from photographs to needlework, practically anything made by Mount Saint Vincent students, staff, faculty and alumnae was eligible for entry. Group projects, musical and dramatic performances, were also welcome.

ELIZABETH MACKENZIE: REUNION

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery

Reunion *is* an ongoing series of hundreds of graphite drawings on translucent vellum. Each drawing derives from the same photograph of the artist's late mother, taken when she was the same age as the artist is now. The intentionally blurred, out-of-focus images appeared to advance and recede in space and, by inference, in time. Technically the drawings are portraits, yet when hung en masse the shadowy likeness mutates into that of an infant, a businessman, the artist, or whatsoever a viewer might be predisposed to "recognize." Mackenzie's installation at MSVU Art Gallery incorporated further drawings done directly on the gallery wall.

14 January through 29 February 2004

LECTURE NOTES

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery

Ingrid Jenkner & Tania Sures, Curators

With works in various media by Michael Fernandes, Rainer Ganahl, Mike Hein, Suzy Lake, John Marriott, and Adrian Piper, **Lecture Notes** had plenty to say about the giving and receiving of lectures. The art documented or recreated the lecture as a teaching situation, content-free spectacle, celebrity forum, or occasion for daydreaming, among other possibilities. Some works were funny and others, unsettling. All were relevant to post-secondary education, one of Metro's most established industries.

6 March through 4 April 2004

ABOVE GROUND: MINING STORIES

Organized by the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria

This exhibition examined the history and culture of nine mining communities across Canada through photographs, maps, books and films. Photographs from commercial studios such as Hayashi Studios, Vancouver Island; Gushul Studio, Blairmore, Alberta; and Shedden Studios, Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, evoked many aspects of life in mining towns and frontier camps. Photography in the early 1900s shared many of the same attributes of prospecting, exploration and entrepreneurial zeal that characterized the development of mining in Canada.

WORK WORK WORK

27 March through 23 May 2004

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery

Work Work was composed of "paintings", a "sampler" and "sculpture" selected from the Mount Saint Vincent University Collection. The works of art invited comparison with activities such as hobby craft, handyman projects and plain old puttering. Plywood, acoustic tile, a tea towel and pantry equipment were some of the materials used. Artists represented included Gerald Ferguson, Kelly Mark, Elspeth Pratt, and Leslie Sampson. With the exception of a plywood sculpture by Pratt, all of the works were made in Nova Scotia in the last 15 years. A highlight of the exhibition was Kelly Mark's 144 White Jars, a group of Mason jars containing white materials such as chalk, lace, hot glue, rice and mothballs.

ALICE EGAN HAGEN, NOVA SCOTIAN CERAMICIST

April 2004

A web exhibition commissioned from MSVU Art Gallery

by the Canadian Heritage Information Network, On-line at www.virtualmuseum.ca

Alice Egan Hagen (1872-1972) attended Mount Saint Vincent Academy, then the Victoria School of Art, and went on to a distinguished career as a china painter, studio potter and ceramics educator. In 1966 she donated to the university a collection of her china, pottery and paintings which was later exhibited and

documented by Mary Sparling and Marie Elwood. In an effort to bring Alice Egan Hagen's accomplishments to a wider public, and to position her critically within the social history of her times, MSVU Art Gallery commissioned new research from the Haligonian historian Dr Janet Guildford. This research was published together with more than one hundred images of Hagen's works, studios, travels, notes and sketches as a "Community Memories" exhibition on the Canadian Heritage Information Network web site. We are indebted to Wilma Stewart, Mahone Bay Settlers Museum, and to Bob Campbell and other descendants of Alice Egan Hagen, for their help in providing images and information. Financial support from the Department of Canadian Heritage and Nova Scotia Tourism and Culture made this project possible.

Statement of Purpose

Through its exhibitions and programs, the Gallery functions as a visual arts resource to the University, communities served by the University, Metro residents and art publics everywhere. Admission is always free of charge.

The Art Gallery reflects the University's educational aims by devoting a significant part of its activities to the representation of women as cultural subjects and producers. This program focus is balanced with exhibitions on themes in visual culture which are relevant to university academic programs and/or constituencies served by the Art Gallery. Artists and artisans from the Atlantic region are represented, often in the early stages of their careers. The Gallery's exhibitions and programs are funded in part by Nova Scotia Tourism, Culture, and Heritage, and by the Canada Council for the Arts.

Since many contemporary artists treat art making as a form of inquiry, the university art galleries are uniquely positioned to promote access to their work. MSVU Art Gallery aims to foster informed, critical responses to works of contemporary and historical art, in keeping with its academic setting. Gallery publications, lectures and talks by visiting artists and scholars are announced in the semi-annual Newsletter.

The Gallery encourages interdisciplinary approaches to knowledge, and its exhibitions are used by students and faculty in their course work. Unique in Nova Scotia, the Gallery's Curatorial Assistant program prepares university graduates for museum careers. In addition, the gallery supports the MSVU Cultural Studies curriculum.

On behalf of the University, the Gallery manages a collection of art that reflects priorities set by the exhibition program and the University's mission. Many works can be viewed in the E. Margaret Fulton Communications Centre and other campus buildings. The special collection of wares by Nova Scotia ceramicist and Mount alumna Alice Hagen is also displayed on campus.
