DIRECTOR'S REPORT

It is a strange thing to report on the activities of a year most of which you missed. Perhaps the most notable element of this report is that, for the first time since 1995, it isn't drafted by Ingrid Jenkner, Art Gallery Director. Since July 1994, Ingrid stewarded the MSVU art collection, led the team that kept gallery operations running, and directed a curatorial program that is renowned across Canada. In November 2018, she began her well-deserved retirement. In December, I came into the picture. To say it has been a year of change is an understatement. Ingrid is to be thanked for no less than cultivating a staff that could navigate the turnover so steadfastly.

Were Ingrid drafting this report, I'm sure she would remark on the past year of exhibitions, public programs, and notable moments in the life of the MSVU art collection. But the contents of this report going forward attest to those details, and in that form they are better conveyed.

I can attest, since my arrival, to the successful mounting of Jenn E. Norton's *Slipstream*, and James R Shirley's *Landscapes from the Soul*: a collection of works selected by Ingrid, interpreted in her absence by the artist himself. We ended 2018-2019 with Skawennati's *Teiakwanahstahsontéhrha'* | *We Extend the Rafters*, a children's exhibition that brought a youthful life to our space. Each of these projects brought in MSVU classes and the broader public alike. In collections, we welcomed a new member to the acquisitions committee, Virginia Stephen, and said thank you to long serving member Susan Gibson Garvey.

Off the floor and inside the gallery offices, we've been talking about our future: about how to keep pushing forward towards a fully accessible gallery that offers a fully accessible visitor experience; about how we raise funds to ensure the resources necessary to keep our outreach initiatives and public programs as vibrant as our exhibition program; and about how we, as a staff, connect with the University and help foster meaningful relationships between the campus community and our public gallery space. We see, in our near future, a blossoming of our community ties and a push forward towards the work of artists who encourage the same.

I thank the Art Gallery staff—David Dahms, Claire Dykhuis, Robyn MacKinnon, Kelsey McLaughlin, and Traci Steylen—for their help in familiarizing me with this organization and its history of good work. Likewise, thank you to Dean of Arts and Sciences Brook Taylor, Academic Vice President and Provost Elizabeth Church, and the entire community here on the Mount who have been so welcoming. I look forward to the many new colleagues and collaborations to come.

EXHIBITIONS

Material Remains

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery Ingrid Jenkner, Curator 26 May – 30 September 2018

Drawn from the MSVU Collection, these works of art incorporated household textiles such as bedding, a tea towel, table linens and discarded clothing. The domestic references were embedded in works whose imagery also engaged with gender politics and world events.

The various artists shared a collage approach to composition, and their works displayed techniques ranging from assemblage, dying, printing and hooking to embroidery, appliqué, stuffing and stitching. Frances Dorsey, Nancy Edell, Svava Juliusson, Leslie Sampson and Anna Torma were the contributing artists. Dorsey's *Shot through the Heart* was a recently acquired fabric assemblage that had not previously been exhibited.

Jane Kidd: Curious

Organized by Kelowna Art Gallery Liz Wylie, Curator 23 June – 26 August 2018

Kidd is one of Canada's preeminent artists working in textile. She lives in Salt Spring Island. The exhibition encompassed the tapestry series *Curiosities*, *Wonderland*, *Land Sentence* and *Possession*. In nightmarish visions of genetic modification, *Curiosities* depicted parts of various organisms spliced together to form alluring chimeras. The shaped weavings of *Land Sentence* were based on satellite photographs of environmental devastation, executed in the toxic palette of the computer screen. Kidd's commitment to handwork in realizing these images of technology run amok was remarkably apt.

A catalogue with an essay by Amy Gogarty accompanied the exhibition, together with a tapestry fragment for tactile exploration.

"It just brings me closer": Reflections on Memorial Tattoos 5 May – 29 Oct 2018

This exhibition of photographs was part of a larger study on the meaning and purpose of commemorative tattoos. The photographs represented the initial part of research conducted by the psychology professors Jennifer Buckle and Sonya Corbin Dwyer, Psychology Program, Grenfell Campus, Memorial University of Newfound land. The study involved twenty-two volunteer participants from Newfoundland. Photographs by Dean Peckfor, Curators

The curators comment:

"Tattoos have become a popular means for people to honour and pay tribute to deceased loved ones. While the research on memorial tattoos is very limited, particularly from a psychological perspective, results suggest they are a way that people can express and process their loss and make this experience visible not only to themselves but also to the public."

The exhibition included quotations from interviews with participants, together with a comments book in which visitors recorded their thoughts and experiences. Having previously toured in Newfoundland, this was the exhibition's first stop off the island.

This exhibition appeared on the main floor of the MSVU library, which is located in the E. Margaret Fulton Centre.

Unpacking the Living Room

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery Julie Hollenbach, Curator 8 September – 10 November 2018

Living rooms are spaces that we arrange and build around ourselves to support the comfort and wellbeing of the family, to host family and friends, to keep our most beloved and prized belongings, and to play and relax in when we're not working. But living rooms are spaces that are loaded with emotions and history, as well as social and political investments. The kind of living room we create says so much about our background, our values, our social position, and our aspirations. Even the privilege of having a living room speaks volumes when so many people live in precarious situations, are without shelter, or have been displaced from their homes and traditional lands. This collaborative exhibition unpacked the living room over three months by staging a radically re-imagined living room in the gallery space that played host to thoughtful community, craft and art, amateurism and professionalism, leisure and labour, and the private and the political. Through playful and insightful interventions, "Unpacking the Living Room" invited community members to reflect on the histories and ideologies that ground understandings of 'self', 'home', 'belonging,' and 'survivance.'

Prospect 18: Christiane Poulin. Echoes

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery Ingrid Jenkner, Curator 13 October 2018 – 27 January 2019

Exhibitions in the *Prospect* series introduce artists in the early phases of their careers. A retired physician, Poulin recently graduated from NSCAD with a BFA in Textiles and the 2017 Starfish Student Art Award. She lives in Halifax. The woven structures of her site-oriented installation alluded to Brutalist design integrated into a landscape. Viewers were prompted to perceive the analogies between weaving and architecture, in particular the aesthetics of *béton brut*. Like her award-winning *Winds of Change: a Lace-scape, Echoes* played with the effects of light and shadow. The components of the installation were touchable. Visitors were invited to interact with a compact four-harness hand-loom in an adjacent room.

Annual Mount Community Show

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery 14 November – 9 December 2018

Mount Saint Vincent University students, staff, faculty, alumnae and their families were invited to display their creative work in this annual extravaganza.

Jenn E Norton: Slipstream

Organized and circulated by the Robert McLaughlin Gallery Linda Jansma and Crystal Mowry, Curators 12 January – 3 March 2019

In an otherwise empty gallery space, six reflective panels positioned in an inward-facing ring created channels of infinite regress. A dancing figure in the form of a spiraling flurry of silk moved from one panel to another. As the dancer traversed the ring, it appeared that the viewer and the figure shared the same physical space. Inspired during a residency in Paris, Norton looks to 19th century inventor and modern dance pioneer Loïe Fuller's choreography and costume design as a performative sculptural object.

James R Shirley: Landscapes from the Soul

Organized by MSVU Art Gallery 9 February – 19 May 2019

Landscapes from the Soul presented seven of Jim Shirley's prints from the collections of Mount Saint Vincent University and Dalhousie University. A writer and artist, Shirley moved from New York City in 1972 to Nova Scotia, where he lived in Cape Breton and then Halifax until 1979. Featured alongside his own thoughts and words, Shirley's Landscapes from the Soul illuminated personal experience in a way that only an artist's voice can.

Since 1979, Shirley has lived in Rankin Inlet, Nunavut, where he is founder and coordinator of the Matchbox Gallery.

Skawennati: Teiakwanahstahsontéhrha' | We Extend the Rafters

Organized by Vox 16 March – 5 May 2019

Born in Kahnawa:ke Mohawk Territory, Skawennati created Indigenous virtual environments addressing history, the future and change. We Extend the Rafters framed the machinima The Peacemaker Returns, a futuristic saga set in 3025, yet firmly rooted in the ancestral Haudenosaunee confederation story. This machinima was an animation-style film produced on the virtual reality platform Second Life. The Peacemaker Returns was designed specifically for children aged 5 to 11 but visitors of all ages were invited to explore traditions and imagine the world of tomorrow in this "museum of the future."

Opening Reception *Prospect 18: Christiane Poulin. Echoes.*

20 October 2018

Performance WORK OUT | WORK OUT was a two-phase collaborative performance piece by Julie Hollenbach and Gambletron challenging idealized feminine gender performance through an immersive theatrical romp that included culinary sculpture, hobby craft kitsch, and a multi-media dance. The first phase followed a group of friends as they attempt to construct self-portraits. The second phase of the performance saw the friends forgo the arduous task of performing femininity to perfection. Opting instead to glitch, disembody and otherwise intervene in the prescriptive works of mainstream feminine

gurus such as Jane Fonda, Martha Stewart, Sheryl Sandberg, and Iliza Schleslinger. This phase of the performance witnessed the friends' collective embrace of the queer pleasure of gender failure.

STAFF ACTIVITIES

Laura Ritchie joined the team on December 10, 2018 and has been spending her first few months getting to know both the Mount community and the city of Halifax. She has joined APAGA, UCAGAC, and CAMDO, continuing her membership in AAM. Laura joined the College Art Association and in February attended their annual conference in New York City.

David Dahms scaled back his commitments to external group projects and committees and reconnected to his audio visual art practice. David continued as a Steward and a member of The Labour Relations Committee for NSGEU Local 81 at MSVU. David entered his 12th year as member of High Hopes Housing Co-op in Halifax. David began a video podcast called "Apropos of Nothing" in 2018, as well as launching a drawing and art based YouTube channel called simply "DAHMS".

Claire Dykhuis presented at the Atlantic Provinces Art Gallery Association 2018 symposium about the Gallery's implementation of accessibility and interpretive services. Furthering the Gallery's commitment to accessibility, Claire supervised NSCAD student intern Jolee Smith, who developed a research project on critical disability studies, institutional practices, and disability arts discourses in Canada.

Ingrid Jenkner (Announcement from Mary Bluechardt, MSVUPresident and Vice-Chancellor)

I am writing to share the news that Ingrid Jenkner will retire on November 2, 2018 from her role as Director of the Mount Art Gallery, following a 24-year career that is rich with accomplishments.

As Art Gallery Director, Ingrid has managed the University's permanent collection of nearly 800 works, and played an instrumental role in the addition of 300 works to the collection (valued at half a million dollars), the majority of which were acquired through donations from artists.

Some of the most notable exhibitions brought to the Mount Art Gallery under Ingrid's direction include: *Contingent,* 1995; *Queen Looking, Queer Acting,* 1997; and several exhibitions of work by Black artists, including *Racing the Cultural Interface; Adrian Piper, A Retrospective; Jim Shirley Returns; Style Council; Romare Bearden;* and *Denyse Thomasos.*

In 2017, the exhibition, *Walking With Our Sisters*, a nationally touring commemorative installation conceived by Metis artist Christie Belcourt, honoured missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls and Two-Spirit people. Presented with the support of Indigenous volunteers and Elders, the installation resulted in record-breaking attendance, advancing the university's outreach to Indigenous communities, and bringing healing to bereaved families throughout the Atlantic region.

Between 2009 and 2013, Ingrid organized exhibitions of site-specific installations by Nova Scotian artists, each one winning the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia Masterworks Arts Award. The Mount Art Gallery is the only Nova Scotian arts organization to have presented three winners of this prestigious annual award honouring excellence in all artistic disciplines.

Also under Ingrid's leadership, the gallery served as a launching pad for numerous careers in the arts, and advanced a commitment to accessibility in its presentation practices.

During her role as Art Director, Ingrid was successful in obtaining grants from federal, provincial and municipal sources that made it possible for the art gallery to fund its public programs, fulfill museological standards and operate at a professional level.

Please join us in thanking Ingrid for her tremendous contributions to the Mount and the arts community more broadly, and wishing her all the best that retirement has to offer.

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Statement of Purpose

MSVU Art Gallery respectfully acknowledges that the Gallery and Mount Saint Vincent University are situated on Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral, unceded territory of the Mi'kmaq.

Through its exhibitions and programs, the Gallery functions as a visual arts resource for Mount Saint Vincent University, communities served by the University, Metro Halifax residents and art publics everywhere. Admission is always free of charge.

MSVU Art Gallery reflects the University's educational aims by devoting a significant part of its activities to the representation of women as cultural subjects and producers. This program focus is balanced with exhibitions on themes in visual culture which are relevant to university academic programs and/or constituencies served by MSVU Art Gallery. Artists and artisans from the Atlantic region are represented, often in the early stages of their careers. The Gallery is committed to normalizing accessible presentation practices throughout its public programs. These programs are funded in part by the Canada Council for the Arts, and by provincial and municipal agencies.

Since many contemporary artists treat art making as a form of inquiry, the university galleries are uniquely positioned to promote access to their work. MSVU Art Gallery aims to foster informed, critical responses to works of contemporary and historical art, in keeping with its academic setting. Gallery publications, lectures and talks by visiting artists and scholars are announced in the semi-annual Newsletter.

The Gallery encourages interdisciplinary approaches to knowledge, and its exhibitions are used by students and faculty in their course work. In addition, the gallery supports the MSVU Cultural Studies curriculum.

On behalf of the University, MSVU Art Gallery manages a collection of art that reflects priorities set by the exhibition program and the University's mission. Many works can be viewed in the E. Margaret Fulton Communications Centre. The special collection of wares by Nova Scotia ceramicist and Mount alumna Alice Hagen is also displayed on campus
